


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#### Mr William Shakespeare's Plays

Read the 'Text' pages in this pack. The text is taken from *Mr William Shakespeare's Plays* presented by Marcia Williams and is the first two pages of Marcia's comic-strip version of Shakespeare's play *The Tempest*.

#### Answer these questions:

Read the introduction to the story. What do you think the words 'foundered' and 'tempest' mean? Use the whole sentence ('Many years ago on a mystical isle, young Miranda and her loving father, Prospero, watched as a ship foundered in a fierce and terrible tempest') as well as the illustrations to work out the meaning.

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### Mr William Shakespeare's Plays

Meet the author and illustrator Marcia Williams.

#### Tell us a little bit about yourself.

Most importantly – I am a Patron of Shakespeare Week! I am also an author and illustrator with a variety of books to my name: novels, diaries, comic-strip retellings and histories. I have also created several retellings of Shakespeare's plays including *Mr William Shakespeare's Plays* and *Bravo*, *Mr William Shakespeare!* 

#### Did you always want to be a writer and illustrator?

When I was at school I dreamed of being an actor. I loved art and writing, but my best friend was better than me at both of these things – I was better at acting! Anyway, life takes many twists and turns and I ended up writing and illustrating books and eventually, rewriting and illustrating Shakespeare's plays. As I began this process I suddenly realized that by creating comic-strip versions of his plays, with an audience, I was at last fulfilling my childhood dream: I had become an actor. Only it was better than that: I got to act all the parts, direct the play and be the costume designer – what could be more fun?

### Do you have a favourite Shakespeare quote?

'To thine own self be true' is probably one of my favourite Shakespeare quotes because it reminds me of the importance, for our own wellbeing, of being true to ourselves and respecting other people's right to be true to themselves.

### How does that quote relate to you?

When I was a child I didn't live with my birth parents and always felt like a cuckoo in a nest of sparrows. I knew inside that I wasn't a sparrow and never could be, because I was born with a cuckoo spirit – even though I wasn't entirely sure what that was, I knew it was different from a sparrow spirit. Years later, when I was an adult and had my own children, I met my real brothers and then I knew at once that my cuckoo spirit wasn't weird, but it was me being 'true to myself'.

#### DRAWING CARTOONS

Here are some of Marcia Williams' top tips for drawing cartoons and including speech bubbles.

#### DRAWING CHARACTERS

• Make sure each character looks very different so that your reader doesn't get muddled.

Get Creative

• Your characters will look more interesting if you exaggerate some of their features. For instance: if he or she has a big nose, make it a real hooter, and if he or she is tall, make them as tall as a tree!

### SPEECH BUBBLES

- Speech bubbles always read from left to right.
- Keep the bubbles at the top of your picture so you have more room for your drawing.
- Write the text for your speech bubble first, then draw the bubble around it. Otherwise you might have trouble fitting the words into your bubble!

### **TELLING THE STORY**

- There isn't a right way to tell a story. When you retell a story it becomes your own, so tell it YOUR way.
- Keep your sentences short and clear. The words are the bones of the story you can add flesh and colour with speech bubbles and pictures.







### POETRY WRITING

Shakespeare is often described as the greatest English poet the world has ever known. His plays were mainly written in verse and he also wrote 154 sonnets, two long narrative poems and a few other minor poems. He certainly had a way with words! Shakespeare's writing didn't always follow the rules and he loved to use language creatively.

### Types of poetry

There are lots of ways to write a poem and some of them have quite specific rules, although some of them don't have any rules at all!

In this pack we're going to look at two different ways to write a poem and give you some ideas for things to write about that are linked to the book Mr William Shakespeare's Plays. There are lots of characters, events and settings to explore in Shakespeare's plays. What will you pick? Ry ?

### Haiku

A Haiku is a traditional Japanese poetic structure which has three lines:

- Line 1 has 5 syllables
- Line 2 has 7 syllables
- Line 3 has 5 syllables

You can use Haikus to describe any part of a story in a short form. Here is an example of a Haiku based on *Macbeth*:

A dagger for death The old King Duncan is slain Servants found guilty!

# Write your own Haiku

First, decide on the subject or theme of your poem. Haikus are traditionally based on anature, but they don't have to be.

Next, write down lots of words that are linked to your subject. Here's some ideas:



Now try and fit your words into the Haiku pattern of 5-7-5 syllables. Don't worry, it might take time to do this and you might change your mind about the words lots of times.

#### Here's an example:

#### Cinquain

The Cinquain has five lines with a fixed syllable pattern. You could use this form of poetry to describe events, emotions or thoughts of key characters. Here is the pattern:

Writing Project

Line 1: 2 syllables Line 2: 4 syllables Line 3: 6 syllables Line 4: 8 syllables Line 5: 2 syllables


Here is an example of a Cinquain based on Macbeth: A ghost That was Banquo Haunts Macbeth at the feast That gory vision drives him mad – Justice!

#### Write your own Cinquain

- Choose an event or character from one of the plays in the *Mr William Shakespeare's Plays* book and start by writing down all the words you can think of that relate to this event or character.
- Which words go together to describe or explore your chosen event or character?
- Follow the pattern of syllables for each line and start creating your Cinquain.
- You could also choose to write a 'Didactic Cinquain', which is a simple type of Cinquain that counts words and not syllables. The pattern for this goes:

Line 1: 1 word Line 2: 2 words Line 3: 3 words Line 4: 4 words Line 5: 1 word

Here is an example of a Didactic Cinquain based on *The Tempest*: Prospero Clever, magical Cunning, plotting, planning, Remembering life in Milan Revenge!





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
